FREEDOM CEREMONY ALISTAIR MACDONALD M.B.E.

Provost Agnew referred to the Meeting of West Dunbartonshire Council held on 25 April 2007 at which it had been agreed to admit Alistair MacDonald M.B.E. as a Freeman of West Dunbartonshire. The Provost then formally welcomed those present to this ceremonial meeting of Council, convened for the formal presentation of the Freeman's Ticket, a decorative scroll to mark admission to that office. In particular, he welcomed the guest of honour, Alistair MacDonald M.B.E., his wife and family members; Colonel Donald Ross, Lord Lieutenant of Dunbartonshire; the Mayor and MP of the Council's twin town of Argenteuil, M. Georges Mothron; Member of the Scottish Parliament for Clydebank and Milngavie, Mr. Des McNulty and all the Council's invited guests.

The Provost spoke of the outstanding service Alistair Macdonald had given to Clydebank and to West Dunbartonshire during his twenty-six years of elected office, firstly as a Councillor and then Provost of Clydebank District Council and later as a Councillor and twice Provost of West Dunbartonshire Council. He then formally presented him with the Freeman's Ticket on behalf of the Council. Accepting the framed scroll, Alistair Macdonald expressed his thanks to the Provost and the Council.
