Report by the Head of Legal, Democratic and Regulatory Services Licensing Committee – 31 October 2012

Subject: Hearing regarding possible suspension of a Taxi Driver's Licence

1. Purpose

1.1 To consider a suspension of a Taxi Driver's Licence held by Mr. David Barry Jackson, 1 Dumbuie Avenue, Dumbarton, G82 2JH.

2. Recommendations

2.1 That the Committee considers the terms of this report, the terms of the evidence presented at the hearing and thereafter determines whether the licence should be suspended and, if so, the duration of the suspension and date of commencement thereof.

3. Background

- 3.1 On 6 August 2012 a complaint was received by email from a member of the public in relation to several incidents involving Mr. Jackson over the weekend 3 5 August 2012.
- The email was submitted by the father of the person involved and she was therefore visited in person at her place of work on 7 August 2012 by James McArthur (Licensing Officer) and Carol Ann Anderson (Admin. Assistant) in order to verify the contents of the email and to give assurance that the complaint would be dealt with.
- 3.3 Mr. Jackson was subsequently interviewed on 10 August 2012, accompanied by a representative of Alexandria and Dumbarton TOA Ltd., Mr. John Corrigan, by James McArthur, (Licensing Officer) and Carol Ann Anderson (Admin. Assistant).
- 3.4 Following further enquiries into the alleged incidents, Mr. Jackson was again interviewed on 14 August 2012, accompanied by a representative of Alexandria and Dumbarton TOA Ltd.; Mr. John Corrigan, by James McArthur, (Licensing Officer) and Carol Ann Anderson (Admin. Assistant).
- Mr. Jackson was advised of the outcome of the enquiries which had been carried out. He was informed that, due to the seriousness of the allegations, the circumstances and information presently available would be reported to the Head of Legal, Democratic and Regulatory Services.
- 3.6 Having consulted with Mr. Andrew Fraser, Head of Legal, Democratic & Regulatory Services, it was decided that due to the nature of the complaint, a hearing should take place to consider the possible suspension of Mr.

Jackson's taxi driver's licence.

3.7 A summary of the complaint can be seen at Appendix 1. The personal details of the complainer have been redacted.

4. Main Issues

- **4.1** A licensing authority may order the suspension of a licence if in its opinion the holder of the licence is not, or is no longer, a fit and proper person to hold the licence.
- **4.2** The period of suspension of a licence is the unexpired portion of the duration of the licence, or such shorter period as the licensing authority may fix.
- 4.3 Where a licensing authority decides to order the suspension of a licence, the suspension generally does not take effect until the expiry of the time within which the holder of the licence may appeal against the suspension (28 days from the date of the decision to suspend) or, if an appeal has been lodged, until the appeal has been abandoned or determined in favour of the suspension. However, if the licensing authority determines that the circumstances of the case justify immediate suspension, it may order that the licence be suspended immediately.
- 4.4 A licensing authority must, before deciding to suspend a licence, give the holder of the licence, the complainer and the Chief Constable an opportunity of being heard.
- 4.5 The licence holder, complainer and a representative of the Police authority have been invited to attend the meeting of the Committee on 31 October 2012 in order that a hearing may take place with regard to the possible suspension of the licence.
- 4.6 In considering whether to suspend a licence the licensing authority may have regard to any misconduct on the part of the licence holder which in the opinion of the authority has a bearing on his fitness to hold a licence.
- 4.7 The matters which the Committee will require to consider are as follows:-
 - (a) Whether the alleged misconduct has been established.
 - (b) If the Committee is satisfied that the alleged misconduct has been established, whether, having regard to the misconduct, Mr Jackson is no longer a fit and proper person to hold a taxi driver's licence.
 - (c) If the Committee is of the opinion that Mr Jackson is no longer a fit and proper person, the Committee must consider whether his licence should be suspended.
 - (d) If the Committee is satisfied that the licence should be

suspended, the Committee must give Mr Jackson an opportunity of being heard on the length of the suspension and the date from which the suspension should commence.

(e) The Committee must then consider what length of suspension is appropriate and whether the circumstances of the case justify immediate suspension.
