FREEDOM CEREMONY SIR JOHN YOUNG (JACKIE) STEWART, O.B.E.

Provost Agnew referred to the Meeting of West Dunbartonshire Council held on 28 January 2009 (Page 1679 refers), at which it had been agreed to admit Sir Jackie Stewart as a Freeman of West Dunbartonshire. The Provost then formally welcomed those present to this ceremonial meeting of Council, convened for the formal presentation of the Freeman's Ticket, a decorative scroll to mark admission to that office. In particular, he welcomed the guest of honour, Sir Jackie Stewart O.B.E., his wife and family members and all the Council's invited guests.

The Provost spoke of the honour that Sir Jackie had brought to his home town of Dumbarton through his outstanding sporting career, not only as a world class clay pigeon shooting champion but also as one of the greatest motor racing champions in the history of the sport, winning twenty-seven Grand Prix races and being three times Formula One World Champion. He paid tribute to Sir Jackie's commitment to motor racing safety, to his unstinting contribution to education through the promotion of dyslexia awareness as President of Dyslexia Scotland and to this support of numerous charitable trusts. He then formally presented him with the Freeman's Ticket on behalf of the Council. Accepting the framed scroll, Sir Jackie expressed his thanks to the Provost, the Chief Executive and the Council.
